Sigtuna is Sweden's first town, and no other place on Earth is as rich in runestones. Here you will also find Sweden's largest airport, a major event arena and many modern hotels and conference facilities. We also have a fascinating history, with people from all over the world meeting here for over a thousand years. The first coin in Sweden was minted here and the first saint of Sweden hails from Sigtuna. You can also visit the country's oldest brick church and stroll along the thousand-year-old pedestrian street.

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SIGTUNA - WHERE SWEDEN BEGINS



SIGTUNA HOLDS a millennium of memories. Around 970 AD, King Erik the Victorious declared a town to be built to form a new kingdom, ruled by one God and one King. Christianity was new to the Nordic people, who now had to leave the Norse gods behind. Sigtuna became Sweden's first town.

Erik traded land plots for loyalty. Tradesmen and landowners became his allies. Their plots in Sigtuna were gifts that increased in value as Sigtuna developed into a trading hub with international flair.

The town's original street plan is largely preserved to this day. When walking on Stora Gatan, you literally walk 3 meters on top of the original main street.

COSMOPOLITAN

Around 1000 AD, Sigtuna had 1 000 inhabitants. Discoveries show trade with Byzantium, Russia, Poland, Ukraine, and the Middle East. Some guilds were represented on a permanent basis. They all shared knowledge and craftsmanship as well as cultures and languages with each other.

FIRST COIN

Olof Skötkonung, son and heir to King Erik, ordered Sweden's first coins to be minted here. He brought silver and coin masters from England. The first Swedish coins have King Olof on one side and a cross on the other. The Latin letters "OLOF REX SVEVORUM" (OLOF KING OF

THE SWEDES) frame the picture. During 995-1030 AD, over 2 million coins were minted here.

FIRST FEMALE SAINT

Olof's daughter, Ingegerd, became a powerful woman. She married the emperor Jaroslav. During their reign, Kiev's Sophia Cathedral was built. She was an advisor and peacekeeper in what is now Ukraine and Russia. She later became an Orthodox saint, St. Anna.

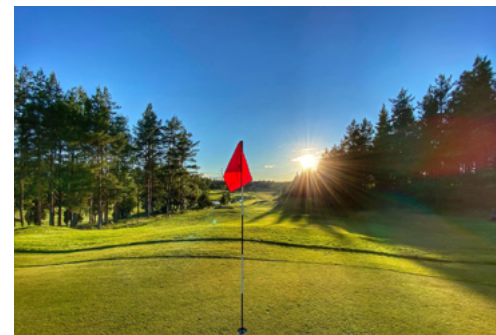

STENINGE CASTLE

The area around Steninge has a history reaching back to prehistoric times. Here you will find the beautiful Steninge Castle from 1705 by the famous Swedish architect Nicodemus Tessin the Younger. There is a lovely baroque park, a Sphinx avenue from 1703 and a bell tower from 1690.

The castle is a private residence and is not open for tours.

WENNGARN CASTLE

Each period, with its counts, dukes and landlords have left their marks on Wenngarn since the 12th century, when a dispute over heritage was described in Sweden's oldest preserved letter. Owners such as Swedish King Gustav Vasa and Magnus Gabriel De la Gardie have contributed to the castle's appearance today.

Wenngarn is packed with exciting historical anecdotes and contains one of Sweden's best-preserved castle chapels, dating from Sweden's Age of Greatness.

SKOKLOSTER CASTLE

Welcome to the 17th century, Sweden's Age of Greatness, and to one of the most evocative and astonishing milieus in Europe. Skokloster Castle is one of the most beautiful Baroque castles in the world, situated in lovely surroundings on the shore of Lake Mälaren. The castle was built between 1654 and 1676 for Count Carl Gustaf Wrangel. Here you can find magnificent collections of crafts, unique paintings and a large armoury.

SKÅNELAHOLM MANOR HOUSE

The romantic castle is situated in an old cultural landscape at Lake Fysingen. Skånelaholm was built by Andreas Gyldenklou in 1639–1643 in the German-Dutch late Renaissance style. The estate was mentioned as early as 1276 in a Bill of Sale.

The castle contains well-preserved interiors and has a large collection of furniture, art, porcelain, books, allmoge (country) objects, and wagons. There is also a beautiful English landscape garden. Don't miss the large Sälva runestone in the northern part of the park.

ROSERSBERG PALACE

This royal palace was built by Gabriel Bengtsson Oxenstierna in the 1630s. Here, you can find some of Europe's best-preserved Empire interi-

ors. The palace features a beautiful English park, as well as a café, restaurant, and hotel. Guided tours are available in English.

SIGHTSEEING

SIGTUNA

Sigtuna is Sweden's first town, established in the 970s by **King Erik the Victorious**. It was both a political and a religious center for centuries. The town's main artery, Stora Gatan, remains the same as it did 1000 years ago. In the year 995, Sweden's first coin was made here, ordered by **King Olof**, son of King Erik who founded Sigtuna. SIGTUNA MUSEUM

SIGTUNA TOWN HALL

Sigtuna Town Hall is probably the smallest town hall in Sweden, perhaps even in Europe. Designed in the 1740s by Mayor Erik Kihlman, it fea-

LUNDSTRÖM'S HOME AND MERCANTILE SHOP

In the bourgeois home of Lundström, time has stood still since the early 1900s. Here lived the Lundström family who ran a 'good purchase trade'. At the shop, you could buy everything from fabric, buttons, paper, and umbrellas to food such as pork, herring, syrup, coffee and canned goods. Part of Sigtuna Museum and open for tours. VIBY VILLAGE

A couple of kilometres outside Sigtuna town you will find the old crofter's homestead, Viby. The buildings have been left untouched for over 200 years. Generations of crofters have lived here, often under harsh conditions and considerable poverty. Viby village is preserved by the Swedish Heritage Board. VIBY BY, 193 91 SIGTUNA

THE STONE BARN

In the center of Steninge Castle Village, close to Steninge Castle, you will find the stately stone barn, Stenladan. It was built by Oscar von Otter in 1873. Inside, you can discover home decor, culture and a restaurant in a unique, historical setting. Outside Stenladan is Lilla Steninge, a playground inspired by Steninge's rich history.

CHURCHES

Sigtuna was established as a Christian community and during the Middle Ages there were no fewer than seven stone churches. Three are still standing as ruins: St. Peter, St. Lawrence and St. Olaf, all built during the 12th century. The Church of St. Mary (Mariakyrkan) is the oldest brick building in the Mälaren Valley. It was built by Dominican friars during the 13th century and is still in use. The churches in Husby-Ärlinghundra, Norrsunda and Skånåla were built in the 12th century and are three of Sweden's rare churches with a tower in the East. Odensala Church was built at the start of the 13th century. Albertus



Pictor decorated the walls with biblical motifs in the 15th century. Haga Church has a beautiful baptismal font and a thurible from the early 1200s.

St. OLAF'S CHURCH RUIN

St. Olaf's church ruin is one of three remaining medieval church ruins. Archaeological excavations have found that the church remnants of today rest on an even older church. The church was probably built around the turn of the 1100s.

St. LAWRENCE'S CHURCH RUIN

Ruins of a medieval church in Sigtuna town parish. It was, like the other stone churches, in use until the Reformation and was then left to dilapidate.

St. PETER'S CHURCH RUIN

Ruins of a medieval church built around the year 1100. The church was probably built by and for the king.

DRAKEGÅRDEN

Dating from the 1700s, the beautiful Drakegården has served as both an inn and a private residence. The beautiful garden is open to the public.

THE HERBAL GARDEN

The small herbal garden next to the Church of St. Mary's commemorates the friars who served in the Dominican convent in Sigtuna during the Middle Ages and their knowledge of cultivation and medicinal plants.

KULTURGÅRDEN

- PLÅT-PELLE'S HOUSE

The beautiful cultural seat, Kulturgården, was designed by Evert Milles in 1917. It houses arts and crafts exhibitions.

SIGTUNASTIFTELSEN

(THE SIGTUNA FOUNDATION) Sigtunastiftelsen was created by Manfred Björkquist in the 1910s. It has, for many years, been a cultural Christian meeting place favored by

many authors. The library is famous for its collections of newspaper cuttings.

SIGTUNA BOOK KIOSK

At the end of Stora Gatan, the 1000-year-old street winding through town, you will find Sigtuna's Book Kiosk. This tiny library, converted from an old phone booth in 2014, allows you to borrow and return books during the summer.

KLOCKBACKEN

Klockbacken ("the Bell Hill") is a park in central Sigtuna town and a perfect spot for nature lovers. There are several walking paths and a popular barbecue area. The clock tower, which dated back to the early 17th century, was destroyed in

a fire on 30 June 2016, but has since been restored according to old drawings.

IN SEARCH OF RUNES

No other town in the world is as rich in runestones as Sigtuna. In the town itself there are between 15 to 20 stones. In the municipality you will find over 170 runestones. Most of the runestones were erected in the 11th Century in memory of deceased family members and were intended to be seen by others.

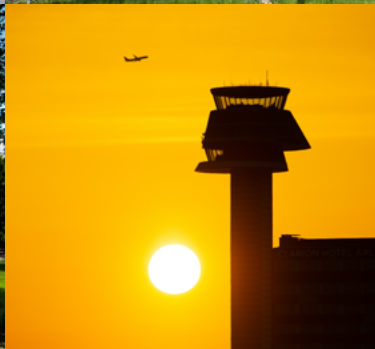


Pick up a map of the runestones at Sigtuna Museum or download it from Destination Sigtuna's website.

OUR VISITORS are sometimes surprised when advised to look for runestones near the many early Christian churches (built of stone in the 12th and 13th centuries). "Weren't the Vikings heathens?" Not many know that the majority of all runestones are Christian. The cross on the stones indicates this. When churches were later built, runestones proved to be quite good building material.

If you find yourself at Arlanda Airport, don't miss the chance to see the runestone located in the walkway between terminals 2 and 3.
